To that end, Bee Vradenburg Foundation is proud to present the following strategic priorities as a framework for the ongoing collaborative effort to advance the vital role of arts and culture in our region:

- Leverage the Foundation's reputation and expertise to increase support for historically underrepresented artists and communities.
- 2 Invest in catalytic and innovative work that expands inclusive access to the arts for all people within the Pikes Peak Region.
- 3 Promote equitable and inclusive grantmaking practices for the greater benefit of arts and culture organizations in the Pikes Peak Region.

Throughout this report you will see evidence of how this vision and these priorities are already being threaded into our work and making impact within the arts and culture sector we have sought to serve since 2002. We welcome your ideas and suggestions on how we can best advance these goals and bring our broader and more diverse community together. EMERGING ARTS LEADERS INITIATIVE

In 2023 the Foundation continued to invest in equity-focused work through its Emerging Arts Leaders Initiative (EALI), which engages arts leaders from marginalized communities in accomplishing project-based professional development goals. EALI addresses the vital role of creative leadership in driving resiliency and growth for the arts, asking emerging leaders to consider: What do YOU need to benefit your community through the arts?

With holistic, tailored support from BVF staff, trustees and partners, EALI provides emerging leaders room to plan, fail constructively, and pursue the full scope of their vision. Long-term, EALI will help to build a more diverse pool of professional creatives ready to serve on boards, drive policy, and lead mainstay arts organizations.

BVF's 2023 Emerging Arts Leaders were Ashley Cornelius, Pikes Peak Poet Laureate and co-founder of Poetry719, and Moni Hernandez, CEO of VIVA Marketing and co-founder of the Fiestas Patrias Hispanic heritage festival. Both leaders identified and pursued ambitious professional development goals to increase their impact as arts and culture changemakers. Through EALI, Ashley managed the transition from a career in clinical healthcare to full-time work as a freelance creative, completing a mural, publishing a book of original poems, participating in Colorado Springs Leadership Institute, and hosting a free workshop on the role of the arts in self-care that received national media coverage and sparked further examination of how historic inequities impact the mental health of people of color. Meanwhile, Moni secured competitive statewide arts grants, forged new partnerships with cultural and higher education institutions, and honed VIVA's value proposition as a social impact business promoting cultural pride for Southern Colorado Hispanic communities while assisting young women from challenged circumstances in advancing their careers.

BEE AN ARTS CHAMPION

The Bee an Arts Champion Award, presented by Bee Vradenburg Foundation, honors the legacy of Bee Vradenburg by recognizing individuals who have demonstrated sustained, passionate, and innovative leadership toward advancing the arts in the Pikes Peak Region. The award includes an honorary grant to an organization of the recipient's choice.

This year the Foundation board chose to recognize Nasit Ari and Charlease Elzenga-Bobo for their many years of work on behalf of the Chamber Orchestra of the Springs, which celebrated its 40th anniversary season in 2023-24. The trustees especially commend Charlease and Nasit's long-term commitment to both the visionary effort of board strategy and hands-on volunteering – a combination particularly valuable and impactful in small arts organizations with limited staff hours. The steady, responsible growth trajectory of this organization over many years is to their credit. The board also appreciates Nasit and Charlease's dedication to backing artistic leadership in highlighting new works and diverse repertoire. The Chamber Orchestra tackles ambitious projects, such as Enough: Voices Against Abuse and Blind Injustice, that succeed in part thanks to robust community partnerships, and many hours of legwork have gone into these and other successes. Our region and our arts sector are richer thanks to their steadfast service.

Foundation INITIATIVES

CHARLEASE ELZENGA-BOBO

INTERNSHIPS

Paid internship placements through the Foundation provide students the opportunity to gain skills for arts careers, diversifying the field of young professionals ready to take on leadership roles in the community.

In 2023 the Foundation provided grants to UCCS Theatreworks and Green Box Arts to hire UCCS students Livia Demopoulos and Abraham Guevara. Livia developed and implemented community outreach strategies for Theatreworks' free traveling summer Shakespeare production, while Abraham worked with internationally respected sculptors and place-based artists to plan and execute the installation of their work as part of the Green Box Arts Festival.

Said intern Abraham Guevara of his experience at Green Box, "I am incredibly grateful for the support, encouragement, and guidance I received throughout my internship. The experience has not only broadened my horizons but has also left an indelible mark on my career aspirations. I am excited to carry forward the insights and skills gained from this experience as I embark on the next chapter of my journey in the world of art administration."

A VOICE FOR THE ARTS

In addition to grantmaking, Bee Vradenburg Foundation is deeply committed to promoting the sustainability of the arts and culture sector and expanding awareness of its assets. Through thought partnership with other funders, the Foundation more than doubled its grantmaking impact in 2023, with an additional \$201,000 from other funders going to BVF-funded projects and organizations based on promotion by Foundation staff.



APPROACH TO EQUITABLE GRANTMAKING



TOWARD EQUITY IN THE ARTS

The following graphics show the Foundation's progress on internal goals: to diversify its leadership in a meaningful way and to increase grant funding for Black and Brown artists, arts leaders, and audiences by 10 percentage points annually until such grants make up at least one-third of the Foundation's annual giving. For both commitments, the Foundation holds itself accountable by publishing progress reports regularly.

Bee Vradenburg Foundation is proud to demonstrate that over half of its grants given in 2023 supported organizations and projects that included participants of color. Up from just three percent of projects in 2019, more Foundation-funded projects now reflect the contributions of Black and Brown community members in some way. This can be attributed to our community's growing awareness of the importance of using and tracking the effectiveness of inclusionary strategies as part of their overall work, as well as the Foundation's ongoing promotion of such strategies as vital components of relevance, resilience and greatness in the arts.

While this number is significant in aggregate, much room for progress remains. Bee Vradenburg Foundation envisions an inclusive and vibrant Pikes Peak community where *everyone* can experience belonging and connection through the arts.



PASSING THE TORCH

In 2023 Bee Vradenburg Foundation made its largest grant to date as it transferred \$589,909 in assets to the Colorado Springs Philharmonic Foundation. Formerly known as the Symphonic Music Fund, these monies were held by BVF for 15 years following the dissolution of the Colorado Springs Symphony. They now form the base of the Bee Vradenburg Fund at the Colorado Springs Philharmonic Foundation, continuing to honor Bee's legacy by supporting the work of the Philharmonic into its second century. The transfer of the fund to CSPF shows an abiding faith in the organization and its future as the backbone of symphonic music in our region.

BEE VRADENBURG FOUNDATION GOALS

- 1 Advocate for arts and arts education as a vital part of the region's economy and quality of life.
- 2 Support emerging and diverse artists, art forms, audiences, and artistic endeavors.
- **3** Foster growth and resilience for arts organizations that are part of the cultural fabric of the region.
- **4** Build organizational capacity of arts groups.
- 5 Cultivate partnerships with businesses and funders to leverage new financial resources for the arts.

ELIGIBILITY

Organizations may apply for funding once per year. All organizations applying to the Foundation must:

- Be a nonprofit, tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organization; or be an arts-oriented project or organization under the fiscal sponsorship of a 501(c)(3) organization.
- Be based in and serve the Pikes Peak Region, defined as El Paso County and the Ute Pass corridor of Teller County to include Woodland Park.
- Have an active employment nondiscrimination policy signed by the board chair that is inclusive of race, creed, color, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, physical or mental handicap, veteran status and marital status.

INELIGIBLE FOR FUNDING

The following activities or organizations are ineligible for funding from the Foundation:

- Individual artists or art students.
- Organizations that are not 501(c)(3) nonprofits or under the fiscal sponsorship of a nonprofit.
- Performances or arts events designed primarily as fundraisers for non-arts organizations.

Funding PROCESS

GRANT SIZES

Grants are based on the size of an organization's budget.

Organizations with prior-year or current-year revenues of **\$50,000 or less** may request UP TO \$**2,500** PER YEAR

UP TO \$**15,000** PER YEAR

may be requested by organizations with prior-year or current-year revenues of **more than \$50,000**.

Organizations applying for **capital support** should contact the Foundation before submitting a request.

GRANTS FOR EQUITY IN THE ARTS

Grant application forms are available at **BeeVradenburgFoundation.org**. Applicants may submit applications by mail, in person, or via email. For email applications, please combine the entire application in a single PDF attachment.

DEADLINES -

Applications are accepted year-round but must be received **Jan. 15, Apr. 15, Jul. 15** or **Oct. 15** to be considered during quarterly trustee meetings. When those dates fall on a holiday or weekend, the first weekday thereafter applies.
